Cypriot President Demetris Christofias and First Lady open Yeronisos Twentieth Anniversary Celebrations

President of the Republic of Cyprus Demetris Christofias and Mrs. Elsi Christofias opened the Yeronisos Island Expedition's Twentieth Anniversary Ranieri Conference on Friday evening Sept. 24th at NYU's Hemmerdinger Hall. "Archaeologies of Yeronisos Off Cyprus: The Island Beyond the Island" brought together an international group of speakers, the Yeronisos Expedition team, over sixty NYU undergraduate team members from years past, faculty, members of the diplomatic community, and the New York public. Dean of the College Matthew Santirocco welcomed the audience, President Emeritus John Brademas offered greetings, and President Christofias spoke on the importance of the study and preservation of Cypriot cultural heritage. First excavator of Yeronisos, Sophocles Hadjisavvas, and director of the Yeronisos Island Excavations, Joan Breton Connelly, delivered the keynote address, "Saving and Exploring Yeronisos: A Cyprus-American Collaboration." Friend of Yeronisos Charles Scribner III gave closing remarks. The next

day, six speakers presented on the archaeology and ecology of Yeronisos from the Chalcolithic through the Byzantine periods. Speakers travelled from Cyprus, Greece, the U.K. and Poland to present their work, now published in the *Report of the Department of Antiquities of Cyprus* for 2010.



Four artifacts from Yeronisos are featured in the show, including the lion's head waterspout, discovered by George Marshall Peters (NYU '94) in 1993, and three Ptolemaic amulets.
